## **BOARD OF EDUCATION** The School District of Independence

The Board of Education met in regular session Tuesday, March 13, 2018, at 6:00 p.m. in the Board Room at the Board of Education Office, 201 North Forest Avenue, Independence, Missouri.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Jill Esry, and minutes of the meeting were recorded by the secretary, Ms. Annette Miller. Mrs. Esry welcomed everyone attending the meeting including students from MCC and Graceland as well as AFS students.

Blake Roberson made the motion to approve the March 13, 2018 Agenda as printed. The motion was seconded by Matt Mallinson and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Mrs. Esry asked if any staff member or patron wished to address the Board of Education. No one responded.

Dr. Herl called on Don Coffman, American Foreign Exchange Student Program Coordinator, to introduce the AFS students in attendance. The students introduced themselves and told which high school they were attending, activities they participated in, and who their AFS parents were as follows. Students were: Pierrick Gourlet from France, Gaia Lecis from Italy, Daniel Kuropka from Slovakia, Regina Lopez Atala from Chile, Gabriel Martins de Amorim from Brazil, Victoria Barrientos from Argentina, Meitong Li from China, Eline Aarne from Norway, Lene Gentner from Germany, and Sohei from Japan.

Dr. Herl stated the List of Bills totals \$24,817,557.93 for the month of March. He said the Bills will fluctuate mainly due to the Bond Issue projects. The Administration is recommending letting bids for replacement of the existing District phone system and for District custodial and operational supplies.

Greg Finke made the motion that the Board of Education approves the March 13, 2018 Consent Agenda as printed.

The motion was seconded by Ann Franklin and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Herl shared information on several legislation Bills. HB2247 is a Charter School bill and people are encouraged to contact their legislators to oppose this bill which is being debated in the Legislature this week. He said the District will continue to monitor this bill. SB612 is a voucher bill. Senator Rizzo did a fantastic job along with five other senators doing a filibuster so the Bill has been laid over and has not come to a vote. HB1847 is a TIF (Tax Increment Finance) bill and he drove to Jefferson City Monday evening to testify but ultimately did not get to testify. This Bill would allow school boards to have a say in the approval of TIFs. Approval requires a 2/3 vote by the TIF Board to approve a TIF. This Bill could allow school district to stop a TIF bill. Dr. Herl said that he had met with Preston Smith regarding information needed for the new boundaries when the new elementary school that is under construction is ready to open. This will be the District's 20th elementary school and attendance boundaries will need to be changed in that area. Regarding the recent shooting in Parkland, Florida, Dr. Herl stated that the Administration has been working with the Independence Police Department regarding safety issues. The IPD has been tremendous to work with on this issue and Police officers have been invited to stop by the schools and have breakfast or lunch for free. Teachers have been asked to lock their classroom doors at all times. Everyone entering schools are being asked to show their I.D. as part of the safety protocol. The Administration doesn't want the staff to live in fear but to go about their business as usual but also take every act possible to endure the safety of students.

Several items under New Business were presented for the Board of Education's consideration for approval.

Dr. Savidge presented information on the AVID Program. She said that for some students moving from the elementary level to the secondary setting can be a difficult adjustment. The AVID Program helps connect students to learn how to finish school and prepare to go onto college or for a work career. Rachel Henley, AVID's Midwest Director, shared information about the alignment between goals and longtime career readiness. The program is currently in 45 states with over 6,000 schools serving over 2 million students. She explained how this program incorporates rigor, relevance, and relationships. This program will focus on 6th grade students to help those who might not have gone to college so they will now see that they can achieve this goal due to AVID.

Mr. Stutzer said that a flurry of activities is happening at all of the Bond Project sites. Truman High School – the exterior panels are up with the T PATRIOTS name installed. The new main entry work is underway, math classrooms are almost complete, science classrooms are close to completion, working on the collaboration space between the two science classrooms, cafeteria addition is on hold, sidewalk is in where buses now let students off, and the pervious entry area has been demolished. Van Horn High School - panels are in place on the gym, working on the locker room, vapor area is up, roof parapet is in place, working on locker room doors for inside /outside, pouring the curbs, P.E. office walls are up, starting to work on mechanical area, men's restroom is in, putting up walls for offices by the gym, storage space area is almost complete, in the metals classroom workers are running mechanical lines to the equipment on third floor, sprinkler system is in, and work is going on in the culinary classroom. William Chrisman High School - site work is underway, sidewalk is in, will seed the ground, installing rubberized flooring, televisions are installed, weight equipment is in, A.D.'s offices are in and in use, SISCO lab is now complete and students are setting up the equipment, classroom furniture is in, and the display cases are installed. New Elementary School – contractors are caught up on this project, roof deck is on, working on interior framing, hoping by April to have everything dried in, starting to install HVAC equipment, restrooms are stubbed in, starting on framing work on the first floor classrooms, and installation of windows will follow.

Dr. Stout stated that the District had let bids for High School Yearbooks in January. Three bids were received and the high school year book sponsors evaluated the services outlined on the bids. The sponsors recommended that the Administration approve the bid from Walsworth for four years.

The motion was made by Ann Franklin that the Board of Education approves the bid for High School Yearbooks and Service from Walsworth for a four year period. The motion was seconded by Denise Fears and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Herl explained that the District needed to make up four inclement weather days for the 2017-2018 calendar. The Administration is recommending using March 23, May 23, 24, and 25 for the four days. Summer School would then start on Tuesday, May 29<sup>th</sup>.

The motion was made by Greg Finke, second by Blake Roberson, that the Board of Education approves adjusting the 2017-2108 School Calendar to change March 23, May 23, 24 and 25, 2018 to regular student/staff attendance days in order to make up the four days of attendance missed due to inclement weather. The motion was unanimously approved by the Board of Education. (Page 11488)

Dr. Stout said the Administration is recommending accepting the bid from Kirberg to replace the existing cafeteria roof at Truman High School. This is part of the capital improvements plan.

Ann Franklin made the motion that the Board of Education approves the bid of \$73,100.00 from Kirberg for the existing roof replacement for the Cafeteria at Truman High School. The motion was seconded by Ken Johnston and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Herl shared the list of Items for the Board of Education's approval to be declared as surplus. The items will either be donated, disposed of, or scrapped.

Denise Fears made the motion, second by Greg Finke, that the Board of Education approves declaring for surplus the list of attached items pursuant to Section 179.091 R.S.M.o. The motion was unanimously approved by the Board of Education. (Page 11490)

Dr. Stout said the Administration is recommending that the School District enter into a contract with Control Service Company for Automation and Energy Management Services for the HVAC system at all District sites during each school term for a yearly cost of \$37,128.00. This will save the District at least \$2,000.00 annually for the three vears.

The motion was made by Blake Roberson that the Board of Education approves entering into a contract with Control Service Company for all District sites during each school term for a yearly cost of \$37,128.00. The motion was seconded by Ken Johnston and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Herl said the Administration is recommending accepting the bid of \$336,000 for renovation work at the My Arts building. He said this was more expensive than originally estimated.

Greg Finke made the motion, second by Matt Mallinson, that the Board of Education approves the bid of \$336,000.00 from Herner Construction for the My Arts building renovation. The motion was unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Herl said that as part of the District's improvement plan, the Administration is recommending that eight Science Classrooms at William Chrisman High School be remodeled at a guaranteed maximum price not to exceed \$1,596,062.00 from Nabholz Construction.

The motion was made by Matt Mallinson that the Board of Education approves the Guaranteed Maximum Price of \$1,596,062 from Nabholz Construction for the remodeling of eight Science classrooms at William Chrisman High School. Ken Johnston seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

There being no further business to come before the Board of Education, Blake Roberson made the motion, second by Ann Franklin, to adjourn the meeting and go into executive session for real estate, legal, and personnel issues at 7:07 p.m. The motion was approved as follows:
