The Board of Education met in regular session Tuesday, September 10, 2019, at 6:00 p.m. in the Board Room at the Board of Education Office, 201 North Forest Avenue, Independence, Missouri.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mr. Greg Finke, and minutes of the meeting were recorded by the secretary, Ms. Annette Miller. Mr. Finke welcomed those in attendance.

Blake Roberson made the motion to approve the September 10, 2019 Agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Matt Mallinson and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Herl reviewed the September 10th Consent Agenda with the Bills List totaling \$16,441,452.36.

Eric Knipp made the motion that the Board of Education approves the September 10, 2019 Consent Agenda as printed.

The motion was seconded by Denise Fears and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Herl reported the preliminary enrollment information comparing the 20th day of school for 2018 and 2019 shows that the District's enrollment is up 55 students, He said the 2019-2020 school year was off to a great start. Dr. Herl said the AVID Program is going very well. He said teachers are impressed with the incoming 7th graders based on their previous AVID training as 6th graders. Dr. Herl stated the preliminary Assessed Valuation numbers are going the wrong way. Due to the Assessed Valuation information currently received, the District will need to roll back taxes. The Board of Education has approved a special meeting for a public hearing on September 25th at 7:45 a.m. to present the 2019-2020 tax rate levy. Dr. Herl said this is a difficult time for school districts in Jackson County on setting their tax rate levies, which have to be set by October 1st, due to the number of appeals by homeowners based on the new assessment increases.

Several items under New Business were presented for the Board of Education's consideration.

Prissy LeMay presented on the District's Assessment Plan for 2019-2020. The plan allows teachers to gauge their students learning and then improve the instructional practices where needed. Through the growth monitoring, it provides student's their data so they can better prepare for college or a career. She explained that Fastbridge measures learning in Math and Reading at specific grade levels and DnA (Data and Assessment) measure end of unit assessments kindergarten through high school. Ms. LeMay said this is one of the first years that the MAP assessment has not changed. She stated that calendars specifying the specific assessment dates for elementary, middle, and high school were included in their information packet. (Pages 11835-11838)

Following the presentation, Denise Fears made the motion that the Board of Education approves the 2019-2020 Assessment Plan, as required by the Missouri School Improvement Plan (MSIP) guidelines, for the Independence School District. The motion was seconded by Carrie Dixon and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Stout said the Transportation Department had developed 243 bus routes for the 2019-2020 school year based on information from the student lists provided by the schools. This is a reduction of approximately 12 routes which is primarily due to a change in the Head Start Program's routes. He said that the buses travel 6,000 miles per day and over one million miles per year.

Jill Esry made the motion that the Board of Education approves the 243 Transportation Routes for the Independence School District for the 2019-2020 school year. The motion was seconded by Blake Roberson and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Grant said the District is required to review/approve the Local Plan for Compliance and Assurance Statements for Sec. 613 (Part B) of the Individuals with Disabilities Education each year. She noted some slight changes in change speech and eligibility, outlined changes to initial training for para professionals that need to be completed within six months instead of twelve months, and clarification of statements, as well as some grammar corrections.

The motion was made by Eric Knipp, second by Matt Mallinson, that the Board of Education approves adopting the Local Plan for Compliance and Assurance Statements for Sec. 613 (Part B) of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act for the 2019-2020 school year. The motion was unanimously approved by the Board of Education. (Page 11840)

Dr. Herl said the Administration is recommending approval to declare property that is no longer needed for District operations as surplus. He said the District typically presents this information four times per year.

The motion was made by Blake Roberson, second by Denise Fears, that the Board of Education approves declaring the list of items as presented as surplus pursuant to Section 177.091 R.S.M.o. The motion was unanimously approved by the Board of Education. (Page 11841-11842)

The Board of Education met for a Tax Rate Levy Hearing on Wednesday, September 25, 2019, at 7:45 a.m. in the Board Room at the Board of Education Office, 201 North Forest Avenue, Independence, Missouri.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mr. Greg Finke, and minutes of the meeting were recorded by the secretary, Ms. Annette Miller. Mr. Finke stated the purpose of this meeting was for a public hearing on the 2019-2020 Tax Rate Levy.

Matt Mallinson made the motion to approve the Special Session Agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Eric Knipp and unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

Dr. Herl reviewed the proposed Tax Rate Levy for the 2019-2020 school year. He shared a recap of the District's Tax Levy History and explained that, due to the Hancock Amendment, the recommendation is to lower the tax rate levy for the 2019-2020 school year. Dr. Herl said based on preliminary Assessed Valuation dated September 3, 2019 from the Jackson County Clerk's Office, the Administration is recommending a Tax Rate Levy for the 2019-2020 school year of \$4.1582 for the Operating Fund and \$1.3395 for Debt Service for a total of \$5.4977 per \$100 of Assessed Valuation. The District submits the Tax Rate Summary to the County Clerk's Office and then to the State Auditor's office annually, using the State's forms, for their approval.

The Board of Education expressed appreciation for the School District being good stewards of the District's funds.

The motion was made by Matt Mallinson, second by Denise Fears, that the Board of Education authorizes the Superintendent, or his designee, to set the Tax Rate Levy at \$5.4977, with the Operating Tax Levy of \$4.1582 and Debt Service of \$1.3395 for the 2019-2020 school year and to authorize the Superintendent, or his designee, to submit the Estimate of Required Local Taxes to the Jackson County Clerk. The motion was unanimously approved.

There being no further business to come before the Board of Education, the motion was made by Eric Knipp, second by Matt Mallinson, at 8:00 a.m. to adjourn the meeting. The motion was unanimously approved by the Board of Education.
